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## IT'S ALL IN THE WRIST: IMPROVING PATIENT SAFETY WITH BAR CODE WRISTBANDS

*Continued from the February 2012 issue of The Security Beacon*



Last month, ASIS Boston members learned about the trend towards using bar coded patient wristbands to improve safety and quality of care in medical centers while meeting industry mandates. In this article, we continue examining the value of these identifiers in increasing productivity, reducing errors, and providing more focused patient care.

### Properly Formatted Wristbands Meet Joint Commission Requirements

Bar coded wristbands provide a convenient way to comply with the National Patient Safety Goal (NPSG) to “Improve the accuracy of patient identification,” which The Joint Commission has included in its goals annually since 2003. Compliance with the patient ID goal requires that healthcare centers use at least two patient identifiers whenever taking blood samples and administering medications or blood products. A bar coded wristband can provide two forms of identification in one easy-to-access place by encoding the patient name and identification number. ## INTERVIEW WITH BOB ADKISSON, CPP, PCI, PSP, CHPA



ASIS Boston member Bob Adkisson, CPP, PCI, PSP, CHPA, wears many hats in his role as Security and Safety Director at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center –

Milton. In this interview with *The Security Beacon*, he describes his widely varied responsibilities and the value of CPP certification in his job.

**Security Beacon:** Describe a typical day.

**Adkisson:** My primary responsibility here is the safety of patients, visitors and staff. Because of my roles as Chairperson of the hospital's Safety and Environment of Care Committees, I spend a lot of time involved with Hazmat, slips, infection control, quality, environmental, fire safety, and other "non-security" subjects. Lastly, I am also involved with any emergency management and disaster teams. Here at Milton we've had floods, fires, and Hazmat incidents in just the past year. None of this happens in a vacuum. All decisions in the healthcare setting involve a substantial amount of collaboration with a wide variety of functions.

**Security Beacon:** What new trends do you see on the horizon?

**Adkisson:** Even more convergence of the physical, electronic and network security worlds. IT and physical security will be more and more intertwined. It's up to us as security directors to be knowledgeable about all of the aspects of these systems, to understand what our integrators need to be successful. It's hard to keep up, but with the right help, today's security director doesn't need to know how to fix the watch, but he/she just needs to be able to tell time.

Due to this trend, Bob is a big advocate of networking with other organizations and is happy to see the ASIS Boston Chapter holding joint meetings with such groups as IAHS. On the national level, he is also pleased to note that ASIS International is again co-locating this year's **58th Annual Seminar and Exhibits** with (ISC)2 in Philadelphia.

"No one can do it alone," he comments.

**Security Beacon:** Do you have a mission statement?

**Adkisson:** Yes, our officers' mission is to get people where they need to go without adverse consequences. In the hospital environment, this encompasses a great variety of interesting processes.

**Security Beacon:** What changes have you seen?

**Adkisson:** I am proud that while the town of Milton Police Department saw an increase in 2010 calls, calls from Milton Hospital have gone down significantly. We have done this by working with the police to implement new processes, increasing staff safety awareness, and obtaining

de-escalation training. To prevent workplace violence, I use CPA and QBS "Safety Care" training.

De-escalation training brings heightened employee confidence which is the key to fewer injuries and greater staff effectiveness. Safety Care is very effective because it is both cost-effective and sustainable over time.

**Security Beacon:** How has CPP Certification helped you?

**Adkisson:** Short answer is it brings credibility. It helps both in obtaining jobs and in on-the-job decisions. On the job, you get more buy-in because clinical and administrative leaders are far more predisposed to accept or consider a recommendation if it is based upon an accepted, evidence-based body of knowledge. ASIS guidelines are a great place to start in terms of discussing new security equipment, processes or investigative recommendations.

## IMPROVING PATIENT SAFETY, CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1

“The two identifiers may be in the same location, such as a wristband.... Acceptable identifiers may be the individual’s name, an assigned identification number, telephone number, or other person-specific identifier. Electronic identification technology coding, such as bar coding or RFID, that includes two or more person-specific identifiers (not room number) will comply with this requirement.” Once wristbands contain bar codes to provide basic patient identification, medical IT staff can add numerous other identification, tracking, and data collection applications to take advantage of bar code data entry.

**Wristband Best Practices—What They Are, Why You Need Them**

After a medical center chooses the bar code wristband, software application, scanners, and other supporting infrastructure, it is time to put best practices in place. Be sure to do this prior to the actual deployment and wristband design to ensure the right processes fall into daily use. Otherwise, the medical center cannot realize the full benefits that properly designed bar code wristbands can deliver.

Numerous studies have shown that between 2 percent and 6 percent of patients are not properly identified by their wristbands. A College of American Pathologists (CAP) study of 217 institutions uncovered 45,197 patient identification errors. Missing wristbands accounted for 71.6 percent of the errors, but erroneous information and illegible text also plague healthcare professionals who rely on wristbands to deliver care accurately.

To ensure patient safety, the wristband must stay on the patient and remain readable for the duration of the hospital stay. It also must uniquely identify the patient in a HIPAA-compliant manner. The process for designing, formatting, and producing bar code wristbands is not much different from traditional wristbands. The following sections define proven best practices so healthcare centers can create a general-purpose wristband program for 90 percent of their patient needs. Adhering to proven best practices lays the foundation for numerous quality and efficiency improvements. After implementing the general program, medical centers can start evaluating their individual needs for specific areas.

**Conclusion**

Deploying bar coded patient wristbands is simply not enough. To gain the most value, medical centers must ensure that wristbands contain the right information, meet industry mandates, and provide staff with an efficient solution. The reason that nurses and clinicians do workarounds is because the bar code is unreadable, or they cannot scan the wristband without disturbing the patient. Following the best practices discussed above helps eliminate workarounds by providing a repeatable, readable, usable format for general-purpose patient use. Now, medical centers can realize improved efficiency, better patient safety, and higher quality at the point of care.

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*MA Legislative Updates***MASSACHUSETTS PORT SECURITY BILL**

The state is looking at adding a Special Commission for the Licensing of Docking Pilots, whose purpose shall be the development of regulations for the licensure and oversight of individuals engaged in the docking of vessels in the Commonwealth. The commission shall be established within the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security, and shall be chaired by the Secretary of Public Safety and Security. The Coast Guard will establish criteria for certification and licensing.

**POLICE FIRE SAFETY EQUIPMENT FUND HO2481**

There shall be established and set up on the books of the Commonwealth a separate fund to be known as the **Police Fire Safety Equipment Fund**, the purpose of which shall be to make an annual disbursement to state and local law enforcement for active or passive fire suppression kits for state and municipal police cruisers to aid in the prevention of fires resulting from rear end collisions. The state treasurer shall be the custodian of the fund.

*Pending Federal Legislation***BLAIR HOLT'S FIREARM LICENSING AND RECORD OF SALE ACT OF 2009**

Amends the Brady Handgun Violence Prevention Act to prohibit a person from possessing a firearm unless that person has been issued a firearm license under this Act or a state system certified under this Act and such license has not been invalidated or revoked. Prescribes license application, issuance, and renewal requirements.

Prohibits transferring or receiving a qualifying firearm unless the recipient presents a valid firearms license, the license is verified, and the dealer records a tracking authorization number. Prescribes firearms transfer reporting and record keeping requirements. Directs the Attorney General to establish and maintain a federal record of sale system.

Prescribes criminal penalties for violations of firearms provisions covered by this Act.

Directs the Attorney General to: (1) establish and maintain a firearm injury information clearinghouse; (2) conduct continuing studies and investigations of firearm-related deaths and injuries; and (3) collect and maintain current production and sales figures of each licensed manufacturer.

Authorizes the Attorney General to certify state firearm licensing or record of sale systems.

**H.R. 3273: PORT SECURITY EFFICIENCY ACT**

*Introduced Fall 2011*

To amend title 46, United States Code, to authorize the Secretary of Homeland Security or of any other department in which the Coast Guard is operating to enter into agreements with foreign governments or international organizations for the performance of port security assessments. This bill is based on fighting piracy.
