BOSTON POLICE TRAIN HOTEL FIRST RESPONDERS IN CRIME SCENE SECURITY, SAFETY

In a first-of-its-kind initiative sponsored by the Boston Chapter of the International Lodging Safety & Security Association (ILSSA Boston), Boston's hotels received a course of instruction titled, "First Responder Training in Crime Scene Security & Safety," developed by the Boston Police Department's Crime Scene Response Unit.

Hotels rooms are frequently determined to be crime scenes. At times, it can be the result of a fight or altercation, sexual assault, sudden death, suicide, or even, homicide. It is in a hotel's best interest to know what to do when one of these situations arises. The initial handling and preservation of a crime scene can make the difference in the outcome of the case, and ultimately the outcome of any potential prosecution that may result. It can also help minimize potential disruption to other hotel guests.



CPP SPOTLIGHT: MARK H. BEAUDRY, PHD, CPP

CPP CERTIFICATION EXPANDS KNOWLEDGE, BOOSTS CAREER FOR SENIOR SECURITY PROFESSIONAL



After completing two six-month internships with DEA in NYC, I decided that was not what I wanted to do for the next 30 years. However, I gained much interest through the internship about CCTV and various technologies while working in the technical division, so I knew I needed to learn more about technology and integration back in school.

At the same time, Dr. Dick Deming of Northeastern University encouraged me to join ASIS as a student member so I joined the ASIS Boston chapter in 1982. While in graduate school, I took a job at the Westin Hotel in Boston and it eventually led to the position of director of safety & security, in which I stayed until 1996.

I then went to work for Joe Nelson at Lotus Development Corporation and immediately gravitated to the world of computers and the Internet, which was then still known as the, "World Wide Web." Earning my CPP was a huge accomplishment for me in 1996. It not only boosted my personal dedication level, it expanded my body of knowledge of the security profession and I knew that I had found the correct career.

Lotus was eventually acquired by IBM, but I am still here today managing critical projects and acquisitions that are very demanding and which require good time management skills. I have maintained my CPP every year since 1996 and cherish it second only to my doctoral (PhD) degree.

CRIME SCENE, CONT'D PG 1

Boston Police Officer Pam Harris, a senior Crime Scene Services investigator and trainer, recently conducted the training program at the Boston Marriott Copley Place. The training included an informative lecture on the basics of crime scene security and safety, including the do's and don'ts, and maintaining the integrity of a crime scene. The training also included



a mock homicide crime scene that was constructed in the lecture hall.

The mock crime scene contained dozens of individual pieces of evidence, including a mannequin representing the body of a homicide victim, a firearm, shell casings, ballistic evidence, shoe impressions, latent fingerprints, U.S. currency, as well as drugs and alcohol.

Attendees were allowed an up close look at the crime scene, while remaining behind the crime scene tape. Participants were shown how evidence was identified, marked, photographed, catalogued, videotaped, and ultimately, collected from the scene, some for further processing.

As the evidence was identified and discovered, a picture and story of what had occurred began to emerge. The importance of these preliminary steps, including the initial actions taken by the hotel's first responders, often determine the course and direction taken by detectives as they follow the evidence and leads they generate.

The Boston Police feel that the more people trained in crime scene security and safety at the first responding hotel staff level, the more successful they can be in fulfilling their objectives.

The training program can easily be adapted to other industries such as hospitals and health care, public housing, campus and student housing, and others.



ASIS BOOK REVIEW THOMAS JEFFERSON: THE ART OF POWER

Thomas Jefferson: The Art of Power is a wonderful book that outlines the third President's personal and political contributions during his time in public office. Written by Pulitzer Prize—winning author Jon Meacham, this book captures Thomas Jefferson, the man, and displays his depth and breadth of knowledge in languages, science, music, politics, and other fascinating disciplines.

Jefferson was a reader of Locke, Hume, and others who influenced his logic. In addition, this knowledge guided Jefferson to think deeply about what was best for government, society as a whole and for the people.

One arena of Jefferson's behind-thescenes participation was the leverage he added to the politics of the revolution, which he deemed absolutely essential for Americans to pursue individual freedoms and believed would lead to participative democracy. Jefferson and his successor, James Madison, continued to fear that the U.S. might revert to a monarchy. This concern led Jefferson to take many actions in the interest of his vision and the use of power.

The author focuses much of this book on how Jefferson used his remarkable intellectual skills in conversation and politics to express his great faith in ordinary people and the progress of the country. Jefferson was truly complex, patient and remarkably resilient in a time when nothing was certain. The book is well researched and very complete, with details down to how Jefferson attempted to abolish slavery multiple times, including writing it into his original Declaration of Independence (from which it was later removed in debate).

Jefferson maneuvered behind the scenes on many occasions, using his intellect and keen writing skills to manipulate people and institutions in an effort to allow people to live in freedom. Even though he wasn't always successful, he was creative and used the press to express his insights and interests so people would hear his message and support his ideas.

Meacham, a renowned writer and #1 New York Times bestselling author, presents Jefferson as a person who primarily wanted to educate people and create a government with strong political leaders that would shepherd democracy into the future. He is a brilliant writer and this book is an incredibly powerful tribute to the principal author of the Declaration of Independence.
